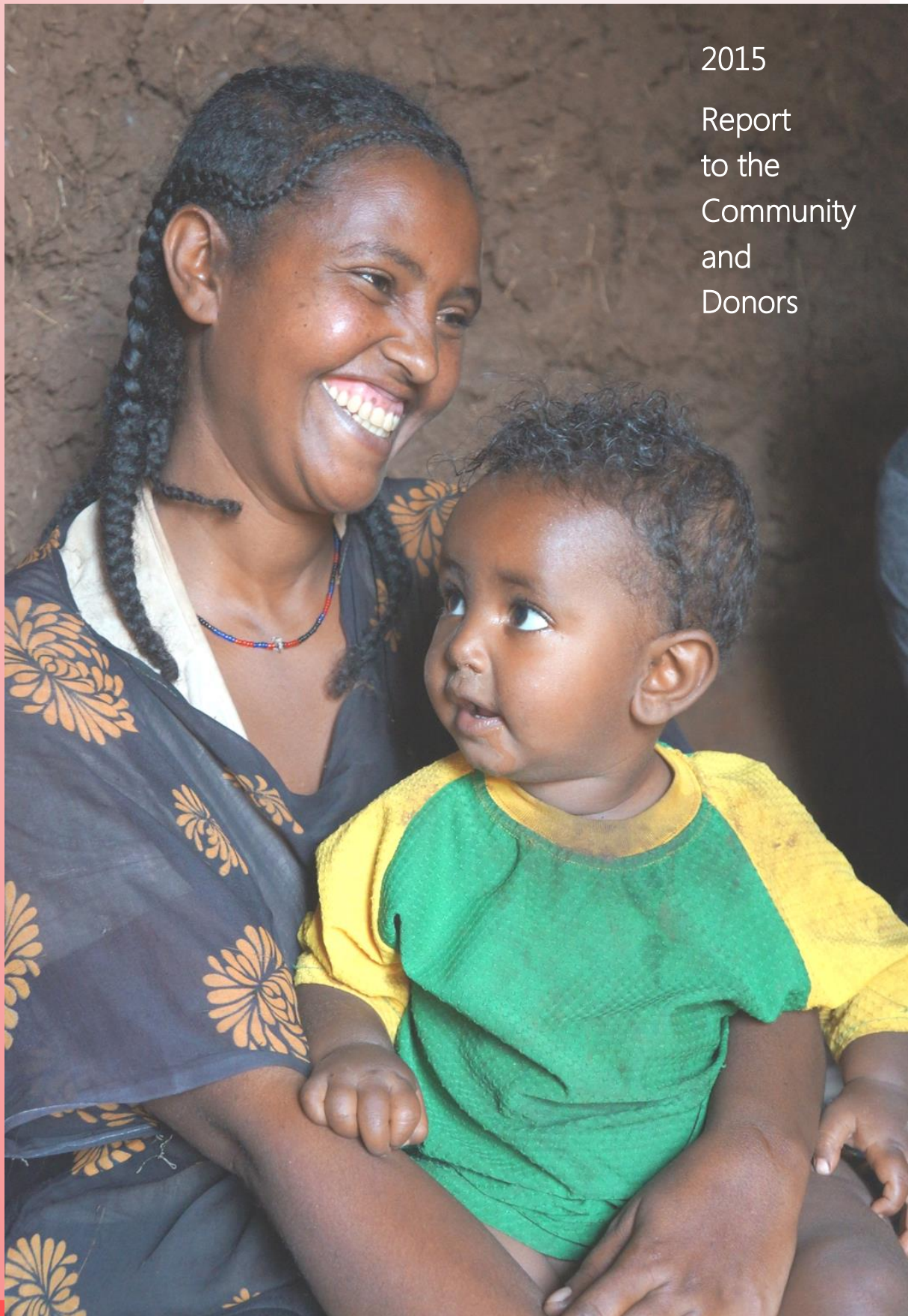

A message from Founder and Chairperson Margaret “Migs” Muldrow, MD

Dear Friends,

For five years the Village Health Partnership (VHP) has worked for safer motherhood in the impoverished rural areas of southwestern Ethiopia where many as **one in ten women die in childbirth**. The support of our many donors in the US and grassroots partnerships with local leadership in Ethiopia have been key to achieving significant results and meaningful improvement in the lives of women and the communities in which they live.

By April 2015 our Screen, Transport and Treat Program (STT) treated 180 women with gynecologic complications of childbirth! The program is having a ripple effect throughout the community—as women return home to live healthy lives, others realize that it is possible to prevent injury and death in childbirth.

We are working to define gaps in the current healthcare infrastructure and to fill these gaps in ways that create sustainable systems of care. VHP's installation of a generator and construction of a Maternity Waiting Area at the Mizan Aman General Hospital opened the door for turning the hospital into a regional referral center for women's health.

To many of you, thank you for your past support. To those of you meeting us for the first time, please consider making a donation to VHP and, in doing so, partner with us for safer motherhood in the rural communities of Ethiopia.

Achievements



Tefera Endalew Yayeh was hired as Director of Ethiopian Operations. Tefera grew up in Ethiopia and speaks five languages.

He is charged with managing our southwestern projects' quality control and outcomes.



Construction of a Maternity Waiting Area at the Mizan Aman General Hospital began in 2014 with planned completion in late 2015.

Previously, women coming in from more remote areas had no place to stay before or after delivery. Many waited in labor on the hospital grounds.



A large generator was installed at the Mizan Aman General Hospital which now provides much needed lighting and electricity for deliveries and surgeries.



We hope to see a 100% increase in the number of women served in 2014 by the Screen, Transport and Treat Program (STT).

We plan to treat 100 women in 2015 and 100 women in 2016.

Plans for 2015 and 2016

Building Capacity for Maternal Healthcare

- Equip and supply the Maternity Waiting Area at the Mizan Aman General Hospital
- Begin construction of a new building at the Mizan Aman General Hospital to house:
 - Obstetric, newborn and pediatric wards
 - Labor and Delivery
 - Surgical rooms for Cesarean Sections and
 - Outpatient clinics focusing on maternal health



Maternal Health Care Programs

- Provide the Screen, Transport and Treat Program for 100 women in Western Wollega
- Develop a model for education and training in emergency obstetric care to be implemented in the rural health centers
- Work in collaboration with Project C.U.R.E. to train medical providers at the Mizan Aman General Hospital and in three health centers using the core curriculum of *Helping Babies Breathe* and *Essential Care for Every Baby* (neonatal resuscitation and care)



Mission and Values

MISSION

VILLAGE HEALTH PARTNERSHIP (VHP) is a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization whose mission is to prevent maternal and neonatal death in childbirth, and to treat and prevent gynecologic complications of childbirth in rural Ethiopia.

VALUES

VHP's work is guided by four principles:

- 1) Human Rights: Safer motherhood is every woman's right.
- 2) Partnership: All projects and programs in Ethiopia are community-based and community-driven.
- 3) Collaboration: Resources are scarce. VHP is open to working with local and international organizations in the US and Ethiopia who are committed to safer motherhood.
- 4) Sustainability: In the future, VHP hopes to support local income-generating initiatives to enable the ongoing provision of healthcare services.

Laury Bowman, JD, Assistant Secretary, is General Counsel for the Kaiser Permanente Colorado Medical Group.

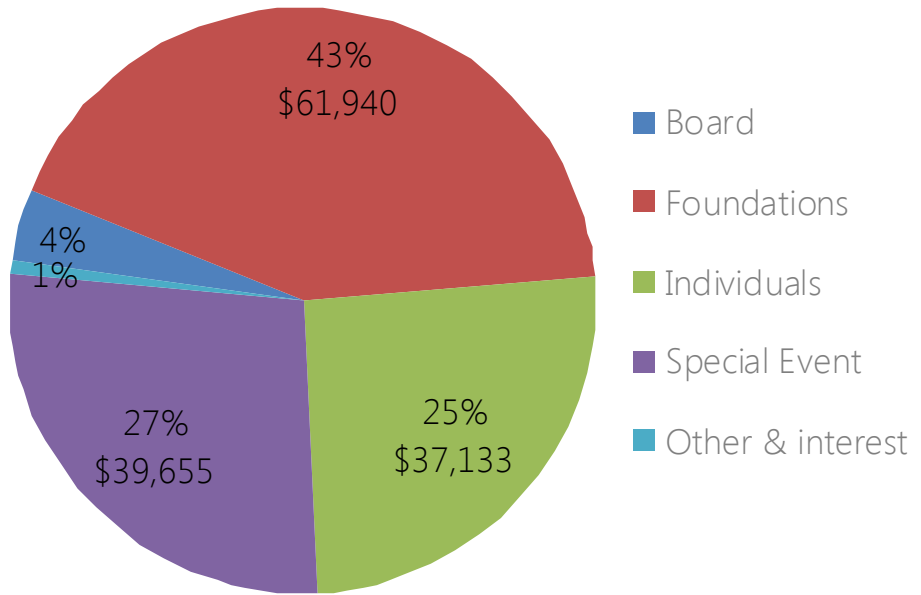
William Kent, PhD, is Principal with TK Associates and has been a CEO of a hospital organization.

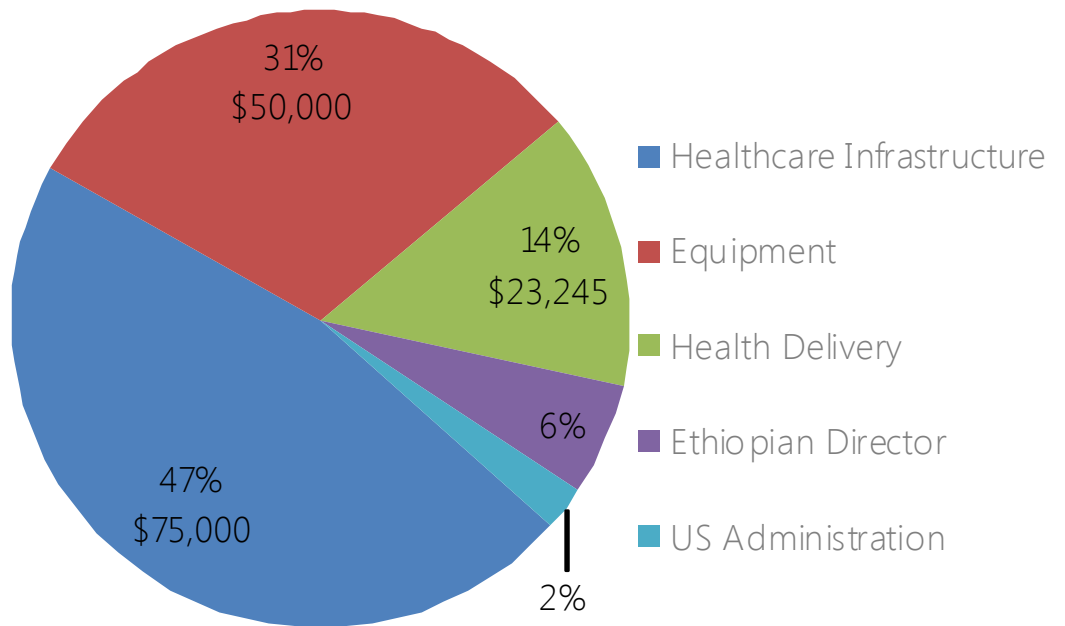


2014 VHP Financial Report (Cash Accounting)
